Take a winter day trip in the 419

Plenty to do even when it's cold outside

As winter break comes to a close and the rest of the cold season stretches out ahead, families should look no further than home in Northwest Ohio to plan a day trip to shake things up.

The month of January is a perfect time to spend time indoors with the family or to participate in winter activities before spring rolls around.

Here are just a few day trip options within easy driving distance of just about anywhere in the 419.

Up in Toledo, families can bundle up and go ice skating outside at The

Ribbon at the Glass City Metropark.

The Ribbon is an outdoor ice skating trail on the Maumee River, located at 1505 Front St., open every day until March 15. You can reserve a two-hour time slot on their website.

Admission and skate rentals are \$12 for general admission, \$10 for children ages 4-12, \$2 for children 3 and under and \$10 for seniors ages 65 and up.

On Wednesdays, the Metropark holds Family Skate, which features a three-hour session for \$5 a person.

The Ribbon is open 4:30-9 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays; 1-4 p.m. on Wednesdays; 2-9 p.m. on Fridays, 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturdays; and 11 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Sundays.

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option in Toledo, head over to the Imagination Station. Open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sunday from noon to 5 p.m. at 1 Discovery Way, kids can learn and experience everything to do with science.

With the price of admission, until Jan. 4, families can visit the Traveling Bricks exhibit, which showcases over 100 LEGO creations.

If you can't make it until after, the interactive museum still has seven permanent hands-on exhibits and five attractions throughout the day.

Admission is free for children 2 and under, \$20 for children 3 to 12, \$21 for seniors 65 and up and \$22 for adults 13 to 64. Lucas County residents get \$2 off, and Lucas County kids get free admission on Saturdays.

The museum also offers free admission for teachers and active duty, inactive and veteran military members, and \$3 admission for those receiving food assistance.

Also in downtown Toledo, cheer on the Toledo Walleye hockey team as they play at home for six games in January.

"It [January] starts with our Crayola theme night on Jan. 4. We also have our Red Wings affiliate night on Jan. 9, and we'll be celebrating Detroit's 100 years of hockey and our connection with the Detroit Red Wings," said Kate Langenderser, the director of omnichannel, marketing and storytelling with the Walleye. "Our heritage weekend, which is Friday, Jan. 23 through Sunday, Jan. 25, we'll be celebrating 70 years of Toledo hockey history ... then we end the month, Jan. 31, with our very popular Bonefish night, where we'll be wearing our Bonefish jerseys, and the players will be sporting their nicknames."

The Walleye pride themselves on being "affordable family fun" offering activities for all ages during the game, Langenderser said.

"Our Crayola game is definitely one that kids will enjoy. There'll be coloring activities throughout the arena ... We have unveiled a new Zamboni ride that we have on the concourse that kids can play on," said Langenderser. "Then we have our two great mascots, Spike and CatTrick, who are always running around and talking to the young fans and getting them excited about the game."

Tickets range in price from \$20-\$29 and can be purchased on the Walleye website.

Moving over to Bryan, home of the Spangler Candy Factory, families can experience the history of the company at Spangler Candy World.

Open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., at 131 S. Main St., general admission into the museum is always free.

There, you can experience interactive games, STEAM activities and robotic stations that mimic the actual factory. View historical artifacts of the candy company and take a theater tour of the

factory for an additional fee.

Theater tickets are free for children 3 and under, \$2 for children between 4 and 12 and \$3 for those 13 and up.


And for an outing in the heart of Hancock County, the University of Findlay's Mazza Museum features the largest collection of artwork by children's book illustrators.

Located in the Virginia B. Gardner Fine Arts Pavilion at 201 College St., the museum is open Wednesday through Friday from noon to 5 p.m. and Sundays from 1 to 4 p.m., and is always free.

While the museum is open to walk through, they will also be hosting events throughout January.

On Jan. 11, they will be hosting their Funday Sunday: Happy Birthday USA event from 1-3:30 p.m. This event has art activities, games, educational stations, STEAM activities, planetarium shows and more. Registration is required prior to the event.

On Jan. 14, they will be hosting Tales for Tots with an interactive story time from 10:45-11:30 a.m. Registration is also required.


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

A TIMELINE OF NOTABLE EVENTS IN THE LIFE OF MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.



Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. dreamt of breaking down barriers and ending discrimination based on skin color, religion, personal beliefs, and much more. Indeed, Dr. King was a visionary and a leader whose life was tragically cut short before he could see the many fruits of his labor.

Dr. King was a strong proponent of change, and his impact was felt from the mid-1950s until his assassination in 1968. Here is a chronology of major events in Dr. King's life.

January 15, 1929: Martin Luther King, Jr. is born to the Reverend and Mrs. Martin Luther King, Sr. in Atlanta, Georgia.

September 20, 1944: After graduating from Booker T. Washington High School a few months earlier, King begins his freshman year at Morehouse College in Atlanta. King graduates from the college in 1948 with a degree in sociology.

February 25, 1948: After time spent in Crozer Theological Seminary, King is ordained to the Baptist ministry at the age of 19.

September 13, 1951: King begins graduate studies in theology at Boston University.

June 18, 1953: Coretta Scott and King are married at the Scott home near Marion, Alabama.

September 1, 1954: King begins his pastorate at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama.

June 5, 1955: Boston University awards King a doctorate in systematic theology.

December 1, 1955: Rosa Parks is arrested for refusing to give up her seat on a public bus to a white passenger. A few days later, the Montgomery Improvement Association is formed to lead a boycott of the segregated buses and King becomes the group's president.

January 30, 1956: King's home is bombed while he is away at a speaking engagement. Later, he addresses an angry crowd that gathers outside his home, asking for

nonviolence.

- November 13, 1956:** The U.S. Supreme Court declares bus segregation laws unconstitutional.
- February 17, 1957:** King appears on the cover of Time magazine.
- May 17, 1957:** King delivers his first national address at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C.
- 1958:** The U.S. Congress passes the first Civil Rights Act since reconstruction.
- September 17, 1958:** King publishes a book, *Stride Toward Freedom: The Montgomery Story*. During a book signing a few days later in Harlem, New York, King is stabbed by Izola Ware Curry and rushed to Harlem Hospital.
- February 3, 1959:** King embarks on a visit to India to meet with many of Gandhi's followers and study the philosophy of nonviolence.
- 1960:** With his family, King relocates back to his native Atlanta and becomes co-pastor of the Ebenezer Baptist Church. King devotes most of his time to the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, a group he and other activists established in 1957.
- June 23, 1960:** John F. Kennedy, the Democratic presidential candidate, meets privately with King in New York.
- October 19, 1960:** King is arrested during a sit-in demonstration at a department store in Atlanta.
- October 16, 1961:** King urges President John F. Kennedy to issue a second Emancipation Proclamation to end racial segregation.
- September 28, 1962:** A member of the American Nazi Party assaults King during a closing session of the SCLC in Birmingham, Alabama.
- April 12, 1963:** King and Ralph Abernathy are arrested in Birmingham. King pens his "Letter from Birmingham Jail" four days later.
- June 23, 1963:** King leads 125,000 people on a Freedom Walk in Detroit, Michigan.
- August 28, 1963:** The March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom takes place, attracting more than 200,000 demonstrators at the Lincoln Memorial. Here King delivers his "I Have a Dream" speech. Later in the day, King and other civil rights leaders meet with President Kennedy in the White House.
- January 18, 1964:** President Lyndon B. Johnson meets with King and seeks support for his War on Poverty initiative.
- March 26, 1964:** King meets Malcolm X in Washington, D.C. This was their first and only meeting.
- December 10, 1964:** King receives the Nobel Peace Prize in Oslo, Norway.
- August 12, 1965:** King publicly opposes the Vietnam War at a rally in Birmingham.
- March 28, 1968:** During a march of 6,000 protestors in support of striking sanitation workers in Memphis, King is rushed from the scene after violence and looting begins.
- April 3, 1968:** King delivers his last speech, "I've Been to the Mountaintop," in Memphis.
- April 4, 1968:** King is fatally shot while standing on a balcony at the Lorraine Hotel.
- November 2, 1968:** A national holiday is proclaimed in King's honor.







Did You KNOW?

Thomas Paine

His name might not have been the inspiration for America's capital city, a state in the Pacific Northwest or countless locales across the nation, but Thomas Paine was a hugely influential figure in the formation of the United States. Born in England in 1737, Paine moved to Philadelphia in the early 1770s and soon wrote the pamphlet, *Common Sense*. According to the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association, Paine argued against the British colonial system, asserting it was rooted in tyranny directed by the aristocracy and monarchy. That assessment led Paine to contend the colonies should sever their ties to England and establish a democratic government. The success of Paine's work is due to various factors, including his writing style, which was clear and simple and thus digestible to the masses, a reader-friendly tone that many historians have noted helped to generate enthusiasm for the notion that the colonies should break apart from the British Empire.

How America got its name

As residents of the United States of America celebrate the nation's two hundred and fiftieth anniversary, some might be curious where the "America" portion of the country's name comes from. According to the Library of Congress, America is named after Italian explorer Amerigo Vespucci. The LOC contends that Vespucci was the first to suggest that the lands Christopher Columbus sailed to in 1492 were part of a separate continent. German mapmaker Martin Waldseemüller honored Vespucci's assertion in 1507, when he created a notable map that was the first to depict the lands as a separate continent, naming the area "America," which is a Latinized version of "Amerigo." That map is now part of the cartographic collections at the LOC, and is sometimes referred to as "America's Birth Certificate."



GETTING TO KNOW THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE



The Declaration of Independence is a formal document that served as the signatory colonies' statement that they were now "free and independent States." It is a vital document in American history.

On July 1, 1776, delegates from the original 13 colonies, making up the Second Continental Congress, met in Philadelphia to vote on Richard Henry Lee's motion for independence. After some deliberation, ultimately 12 of the 13 delegates voted in favor. In recognition of those 12 delegates, here are 12 facts regarding the Declaration of Independence.

1. The drafted document was officially adopted on July 4, 1776, two days after freedom from Britain was approved. However, most delegates signed the document on August 2, 1776, while others signed on a later date. John Dickinson and Robert R. Livingston never signed the Declaration of Independence.
2. John Dunlap was the official printer of Congress at the time. He worked all night and into the morning of July 5 to produce the large, single-sided sheet, known as a broadside. About 200 copies of Dunlap's broadside were made.
3. The University of Virginia owns two copies of a rare early printing of the Declaration. It is on display in the Albert and Shirley Small Special Collections Library. It is believed the copy once belonged to George Washington.
4. Benjamin Franklin, George Read, Roger Sherman, Robert Morris, George Clymer, and James Wilson signed both the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution.
5. The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution were hidden at Fort Knox during World War II, two weeks after Pearl Harbor was attacked.
6. Despite what the movie "National Treasure" will have one believe, the message on the back of the document is visible and reads "Original Declaration of Independence dated 4th July 1776"

7. Richard Stockton, a lawyer from New Jersey, was a signer of the Declaration who later recanted his support of the American revolution. He subsequently swore his allegiance to King George III after being captured by the British.
8. In 1989, an original Dunlap Broadside was found hidden behind a picture a Philadelphia man bought at a flea market for \$4. It later sold for \$8.1 million. Ultimately, 26 copies of the original prints have been found.
9. The United States celebrates Independence Day on July 4th, even though independence was accepted on July 2nd.
10. Early on, not everyone in America was supportive of the Declaration of Independence. Partisan politics led to discord. Federalist John Adams was feuding with Republicans and Thomas Jefferson. The anniversary date of the signing was not widely celebrated until the Federalists were no longer involved in politics.
11. The one-year anniversary of Independence Day and the celebration of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence slipped the minds of Congress in 1777. When they remembered it was July 3rd, they planned a last-minute celebration on July 4th, and each year thereafter.
12. John Trumbull's painting "Declaration of Independence," which was made into a lithograph replica by Ralph Trembley, hangs in the Rotunda of the U.S. Capitol. It is a fictional depiction of the five-man drafting committee presenting their draft to Congress, and not the signing. The painting shows 42 of the 56 signees, since Trumbull couldn't get likenesses of all involved. The men featured in the painting were never all in the room at the same time during the Declaration's debate and signing.

The Declaration of Independence is a key document in American history, and its words are celebrated each Independence Day.

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Tips to clear a Cluttered Home
